Vincent J. Cannato is associate professor of history at the University of Massachusetts Boston where he teaches courses on twentieth-century American political history urban history, and immigration history. He is the author of *American Passage: The History of Ellis Island* (HarperCollins, 2009); *The Ungovernable City: John Lindsay and his Struggle to Save New York* (Basic Books, 2001); and co-editor of *Living in the Eighties* (Oxford University Press, 2009). He is currently completing a biography of Francis Cardinal Spellman, the long-time Catholic archbishop of New York in the mid-20th century (forthcoming, Basic Books).

Prof. Cannato has written for numerous publications, including *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *The Washington Post*, *New York Post*, *New York Daily News*, *National Affairs*, *Politico*, *Humanities Magazine*, and *The New Republic*. He has also been the recipient of two Fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

He received his PhD in History from Columbia University and his BA with Honors in Political Science from Williams College.
